Second, I have been repeatedly amazed by the sacrificial giving of our supporters. "How de we behave?"


"What do we do?"

Going green, going continental

Observant readers might be noticing something slightly different about this edition of Echoes. You might have noticed that the paper in your hands looks and feels different.

The new paper is called Cascades Enviro100 Satin, and we made the switch at the suggestion of Steve Ecker, one of the owners at Carruthers Printing. Made of 100% post-consumer recycled fibres, the paper is the "environmental superstar" of stewardly care for creation, Ecker says.

It is made in Canada and is produced at a paper mill in Saint-Jerome, Quebec that uses biogas (piped in from a landfill 13 KM) away to produce 83% of its thermal energy needs. According to the manufacturer, the paper also results in significantly less greenhouse gas emissions than comparable recycled or virgin papers, largely because there is no environmental cost of wood extraction and there is very little waste. It is processed without chlorine. As a side benefit, the Enviro paper is also easier for our neighbours — the printers at Carruthers — to handle, Ecker said. The ink dries faster on this paper and it

builds up less static electricity than the glossy, coated paper Echoes has been printed on for many years.

Since we were making a paper change, we also considered changing the design of Echoes, but we decided that the familiar shape and colour make this publication a product that is clearly identified as ours.

But we are making some distribution

changes. Starting with this issue, roughly one-quarter of our distribution is going out by Canada Post. In the past, we have relied



heavily on the member mailboxes at 12 Niagara-area Christian Reformed Churches to reach our target audience. But the families at our school attend 45 different churches, so using just one denomination as a distribution channel no longer makes sense. We will continue to blanket the CRC congregations of the Niagara Region — the denomination has an official policy of supporting Christian education









— but many people across North America will receive this magazine by mail. With the help of Carruthers Printing we are using Canada Post's publications mail service — hopefully providing a good balance between being cost-effective and efficient in reaching our readers.

Some of the recipients will be alumni. We now have thousands of alumni and we have been putting some effort into updating our contact information for them. If you are a graduate, we want you to know about the interesting and exciting things that are happening at your alma mater, and we also want to hear from you. **See the box to the right** for information about keeping in touch with us and details about our reunion hosting program. We want to hear from you!





Going Deeper With God



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
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
