The Quest for Meaning



The other day I was at the YMCA getting changed for my workout when I overheard a conversation two others were having about the religious complexities of the world of terrorism which we hear about in the news. One of the men indicated that the problem exists because each group has the dogmatic conviction that they have the monopoly on truth while in reality there are many truths none of which has more authority than another. The other man disagreed saying there had to be one truth that exists.

I am not sure if the first gentleman was aware that he was supporting elements of postmodernism. While postmodernism is difficult to define, it has as part of its beliefs that truth is shaped by cultural and political bias and that meaning and experience can only be created by the individual. This emerging worldview has also had an impact on Christians young and old. Reginald Bibby in his book Teen Trends indicates that teens' interest in organized religion is faltering, while interest in personal spirituality remains high. How is this possible? According to Bibby, "people who otherwise would be worshipping in churches and relying on the authority of tradition are writing and talking about their personal quests for meaning." (p. 59 Teen Trends) Of course this presents opportunities and challenges to the home, church and school.

On the one hand it's encouraging that teens (and adults) are searching, for it means the fields are ripe for a spiritual harvest. On the other hand the church, home and school must be more vigilant in guiding teens in the way of Biblical truths. While all three are concerned with the spirituality of the young, the school has as its main task to connect this blossoming Christian faith with learning. Christian school teachers are challenged to teach the curriculum in such a way as to relay relevant Biblical truths and inspire students to recognize that God is sovereign over all creation. Christian faith cannot be separated from being active participants in creation.

It is our hope that students may realize that meaning is found in the truth of scripture and its application to their lives of service in this world. Perhaps, the man at the YMCA claiming there is one truth was a Christian school graduate. ◀





From the Administrator

Feelings can bend an administrator's perceptions of the way things really are; they can distort his perspective or even sidetrack him from directions God would have him follow. Nevertheless, I need to say that school feels good this year. High scores on

tests (like our school's 98% success rate on last year's Grade 10 Literacy Test), post-secondary acceptance percentages and budget surpluses are helpful indicators of excellence and stability, but there is no substitute for walking down a hallway or into a classroom and getting a strong sense of cooperation and respect. Good relationships are the soil in which good learning flourishes. So school feels good because we are blessed with terrific students whose parents back up what we are doing, and we have excellent teachers who are striving hard this year to be clear in both learning and behaviour expectations.

Our strategic planning continues into its third year. We have seen the fruits of many of the first two years' plans. The major topics for research, discussion and decision this year include the following: a broader instrumental music program, a review of our co-curricular program, a revised human sexuality curriculum, a fund raising protocol, an active alumni association, constitutional review, a formalized staff development plan, harmonized relationships with our feeder schools, and a facility improvement plan.

I am struck with awe at the efforts of our Gateway Campaign committee. They have devoted many evenings and many hours to plan a campaign that will position our school to be a blessing to a new generation of Christian families. Please look elsewhere in this issue of Echoes for details about the campaign. We sincerely hope that many of our supporters will be in attendance when we launch the public phase of our campaign at an SDCH assembly on October 17 at 9:00 am. If you come, I think you will leave encouraged.

SDCH was by God's grace able to finish last school year with a small budget surplus. The board and administration are making a strong effort to do this continually. I would like to give our finance committee and our bookkeeper, Caroline Eyk, recognition for a job well done. Greater detail will be available to our members in the package preceding our membership meeting on November 9.

As in any calling, we respond as wisely as we can to current issues, all the while praying for the Spirit's direction. I feel very good about the school year underway. May we together seek to be faithful to the task of tending to the care and development of life at SDCH, God's blessing to us.


The challenge of educating students with the knowledge and passion to take care of their bodies and souls is increasingly important in today's culture. According to one of our school's goals, as identified in all Physical Education classes, we are to "recognize that our being and resources belong to God and are therefore to be cared for with wisdom and obedience." Food choices, trust exercises, fitness, friendships, drugs, individual and team sports, bullying, stress, and sexuality are a variety of the topics we cover in our Physical Education courses. In each class, whether intentionally or not, students interact with culture through these topics in discussion, and in many cases challenge each other in practical ways to be different...and most importantly, to be Christ-like.

In our sedentary world it is becoming more apparent that the importance of being physically active must be more than taught; it needs to be practiced. Therefore, at SDCH the Physical Education program is compulsory in grades 9 and 10. At these levels the majority of the activities are team sports oriented toward fitness. The senior-level PE classes (which are electives) focus more on individual sports, in order to prepare our students for a lifestyle of healthy and active living.

We have been incredibly blessed with bodies that are able to operate at levels beyond our comprehension. What an amazing Creator we have, who made us so wonderfully. To learn how to engage culture, while truly caring for our bodies physically, emotionally, mentally and spiritually, is a challenge that we as teachers and students face each and every day.
